

NEWS OF INTEREST TO MEADVIEW

The 2012 election has come and gone, and some are joyful and others wringing their hands, but Meadview did it again. We had 632 ballots cast from our precinct and that is a high percentage of the registered voters. In fact, the percentage is the highest in Mohave County, and probably the State. In Meadview and Lake Mead City, we do think our vote counts.

The 2010 census found Mohave County now has over 200,000 residents and therefore we had to have five members on the Board of Supervisors. Our District became #4 and our new board member is Joy Brotherton. She has visited Meadview a number of times before the election and has promised to attend our monthly COM meetings to keep us informed of what is happening in our county and give us an update on future plans for the county.

On that same subject Doris Goodale was re-elected to the Arizona House of Representatives and once again has been named as chair of the House Education Committee. She also is on the Judiciary Committee. Freshman Representative Sonny Borrelli will serve on the Government, Public Safety and Transportation panels.

The item in the last MONITOR concerning the cost of early ballots is ongoing. Arizona Secretary of State Ken Bennett and Mohave County Voter Registration Supervisor Kim Stewart have come up with a plan -- the catch is, 'who will pay for the fix'? Bennett has suggested making changes to the provisional ballot and early ballot counting system. The counting of Mohave provisional ballots ended on November 15, nine days after the election. There were 4,200 provisional ballots, double what is generally received. Arizona allows people who received an early ballot in the mail to drop it off at any polling place on Election Day. Those are shipped to the voter registration division to be sorted and signatures verified then they go to the elections department to be counted. Provisional ballots are given to people who show up to vote without a valid ID or who is listed as having received an early ballot. Money for new software and printers is the catch.

Station #45, located at The Last Stop at mile post 25 on State highway 93 held it's Grand Opening on December 1. The helicopter landing pads have been approved and and fire and medical personnel are in place 24/7 to help with all accidents or emergency medical calls on highway 93 or in the White Hills area.

The Grapevine Mesa area was once again awash with Christmas lights, music and the spirit of Christmas. For many years our little area has been a bright and beautiful shining spot for planes flying the dark winter nights. It must be exciting to be flying at 30,000 feet and in the middle of a dark desert see a huge blue star and then all the little houses glowing in white, red, green, yellow and blue lights.

UPDATE ON LMRFD STATION #43

A new Board member, Kathy Brown, was voted in on November 6, 2012 and Claude Thorpe was reelected. At the last Board meeting Bobby Porzio discussed the recent training at Pinon Pines Fire District for three LMRFD personnel. The training was on the use of extraction equipment, with special instructions on the new electric systems in various 'Green' cars. Chief Mark Hruz stated that at a recent bus wreck on hi way 93 a Penske truck ran into a helicopter that was loaded and ready to take off. No one was in LMRFD Incident Commander, Russ Paronto, handled the entire scene very well. Golden Valley Fire, DPS, AMR and ten other agencies were on scene working under LMRFD supervision.

A Project Manager dealing with the White Hills Wind Farm discussed the Draft and Environmental Statement that BP has submitted to the Board of Supervisors. The new type 3 truck has been painted and is ready for action. Station #45 had it's Grand Opening on December 1 at the Last Stop. The Mohave Board of Supervisors passed the request that will allow 6 helicopters to land at that location to speed up hospital arrival for accident victims from the Hi way 93 accidents or medical calls from the White Hills area. Chief Hruz also announced that beginning in January LMRFD personnel will be taking 8 hour classes on airport and helicopter rescue.

The effort to get more properties signed up with subscriptions for fire protection is ongoing in Lake Mead City and White Hills. If you are not in the LMRFD fire district or if you are not certain if you are, call the main office at 928-767-3300 or check your tax bill. The tax assessment for LMRFD is plainly shown on that bill from the county.

You will be helping yourself if you will bring in a detailed map on how to arrive at your home in case of a 9-1-1 call. A fire is generally visible and can be found, but the heart attack does not have any flashing lights to guide the ambulance to your home.

Kathy Barnes and Claude Thorpe were given the oath of office at the regular December board meeting. Claude will continue as Chairman of the Board, Nancy Hussey will continue as Treasurer and Suzann will continue as Clerk of the Board. At the Grand Opening of Station #45 at Last Stop on hiway 93 fire subscriptions were written for homes in White Hills. White Hills has been in the LMRFD medical CON but a 9-1-1 call took nearly an hour to respond from Station #41 in Dolan. In the first week of having a station on hiway 93, two medical calls came in from White Hills and the response time was 9 minutes. Land on White Hills Road has been offered to LMRFD by private owners to build a station that could house 6 vehicles. Last year's taxes are way past due bringing down to about 25% of what was expected by our fire district. In fact, this year's taxes are very slow to come into the treasurer's office, therefore LMRFD is running on fumes. Fire subscriptions is one way we can continue to man #43 in Meadview. Chief Russ Paronto and Fire Chief Mark Hruz have put together a power point presentation for our February COM meeting and we urge the residents on Grapevine Mesa to attend this meeting, February 7, at 10. Come share coffee and cookies and talk to your emergency fire and medical workers.

A fire call early the morning of December 21 was for the large fire inside the bus barn on Charles. Personnel and two volunteers from #43 responded and were able to contain and put out the fire quickly, Chief Paronto was the Incident Commander at the scene. The structure was apparently not damaged but the walls and stairways were badly charred, no one was hurt.

MERRY CHRISTMAS TO MEADVIEW FROM THE TORNGRENS An interview with the Torngrens by Adrienne O'Keeffe

Each year Meadview area residents have been treated to a stunning display of Christmas lights and figures and a miniature lighted village at the home of Skip and Donna Torngren. In 2001 the display started simply with icicle style lights around the house and has expanded each year to the mega display it is today. Skip starts working on the display the last week of September and finishes just before Thanksgiv-

We asked Skip how many lights are in the display and he thinks at least 75,000. Each year new items are added and Skip changes the layout to keep it interesting. This year's featured new item is a 7 foot wreath that was found in a second hand warehouse (think American Pickers) in Golden Valley. To prevent power outages, Skip has laid many electrical lines with outlets along the way to evenly distribute the necessary electricity. When asked if he had a master plan, Skip replied, "Yes, I do if when walking Dakota and having an idea come to me counts as a master plan." Not only are there about 20 animated decorations, more than 12 reindeer, a life sized nativity scene, Cinderella style carriage, but most of the plants, bushes and trees are trimmed in lights. Skip has developed a method of fastening the lights to Yucca and Joshua tree spikes so the wind won't pull them off. The gazebo features a Christmas tree complete with a working vintage train set. Even the garage door is decorated with a lighted scene projected on it. There is so much to see, you will want to go back several times.

Donna's contribution to the display is a miniature lighted village that takes up two rooms in the garage. The village is in Skip's tool room, so it is put up every year. The village includes mountains, a countryside with farms, a city complete with stores and homes and a replica of Bethlehem. Donna has been collecting the miniatures for 18 years starting with a purchase of 5 houses. Although this is now Donna's project, the first village was created by Skip when he started making paper mache mountains.

We think of the display as the Torngren's gift to local residents but they have a different point of view. Skip told us the display is really a community happening because a lot of the items used have been given to them from many people through the years. He said he could not do this without the generosity of so many people. This year 18 car loads of people gathered at the home for cookies, cider and hot cocoa at the end the COM'S Decorated Home Tour. If you missed the tour, the lights are on almost every night until January 1.






